SMOKE ALARM ACTION DAY IS 1ST JUNE 2025!

Key Message

Take the lead on **Smoke Alarm Action Day – Sunday 1 June and throughout the month** by organising events, sharing messages, and engaging your community in smoke alarm safety.

What's been happening?

From 2001 to 2015, DFES partnered with Duracell to promote changing smoke alarm batteries on 1 April. The campaign ended when Duracell's owner, Procter & Gamble, withdrew support. DFES continued promoting annual battery changes.

With new rules requiring mains-powered smoke alarms, messages now go beyond battery replacement.

In 2024, Fire and Rescue NSW proposed a national **Smoke Alarm Action Day**. This year all states and territories will participate in the national campaign, encouraging communities to:

- Test and clean smoke alarms.
- Check smoke alarms are under 10 years old.
- Replace batteries if needed.

What do I need to do?

You're encouraged to support the campaign on **Sunday 1 June and throughout the month** by sharing smoke alarm safety messages.

- 1. Visit Community Groups
 - Offer to speak at neighbourhood centres, Men's Sheds, child and parent centres, multicultural groups or seniors' groups.
 - Deliver short fire safety talks focussed on smoke alarms.
 - Demonstrate how to test and clean a smoke alarm.
 - Bring along fact sheets for people to take home.

- 2. Set Up an Information Booth Where Local People Gather
 - Speak to people about their smoke alarms. Hook questions may include: "When was the last time you tested your smoke alarm?"
 "Can I show you how to tell if your smoke alarm needs replacing?"
 "Do you know the signs that your smoke alarm isn't working properly?"
 "How confident are you that your home is fire safe?"
 - Give short key messages and demonstrate how to test and clean alarms.
- 3. Support at higher risk community members
 - Reach out to aged care providers, disability support services, Aboriginal organisations, or housing support services.
 - Offer a short safety session with their clients—keep it simple: demonstrate how to test and clean a smoke alarm, explain how to check the expiry date, and emphasise the importance of having working alarms in sleeping areas and hallways.
 - Bring <u>translated</u> and Easy English resources and use interpreters if needed.
 Contact Community Preparedness for help with this.
- 4. Highlight the Campaign During Routine Visits
 - Mention smoke alarm safety when attending incidents, inspections, or other community interactions.
